Their programs raise money for charity and consist of a great variety of music and witty repartee by genial host Will Healy, a Bethel alum (at least the audience views him as genial.) When contacted by the Friends to do a benefit, Will asked if the Library was something new. He didn’t remember it from his days on campus. However, the band graciously agreed to do a show.

On February 11 over 550 people came to the Benson Great Hall to hear the group. They did not go away disappointed. Piano player Craig

Wasner made the whole stage jump. Michael Hildebrandt on fiddle put the “special” in the “Orange Blossom Special.” Harmonica player Stephen Lampa took our breath away, while having plenty of his own breath to do amazing things. The captivating Charlotte DeVries, the lovely LuAnn Aldrich and the superb Susan Lohmann sang with passion. Dan Schwartz, special guest artist, displayed his award winning finger-style guitar picking.



One of the highlights of the evening for many in attendance came during Will Healy’s monologue. He talked about growing up in the neighborhood of the old Bethel campus. Of course, no mention of that community is complete without reference to the Flame Burger. From the audience’s reaction it was clear that they were all of a certain age, since the Flame has been gone many years now.

Well, the night was also a big success from the fundraising standpoint. The Friends received over \$1700. A big thanks to Earleen Warner for all her work on the benefit. A big thanks to *Over and Back* for their part in the evening. And the biggest thanks of all to the Friends’ Board for not doing the concert they planned.

Books like these may not be on the reading list of any of our English classes, but they contribute nonetheless to the education and pleasure of our community. Let me tell you about some other books that populate this category.

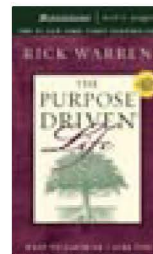

Bethel Librarians Honored

Catalog Librarian Amy Reinhold (pictured, left) and Reference and Program Development Librarian Carole Cragg (pictured, right) were honored at the Coordinating Libraries in Consortium (CLIC) Recognition Luncheon and Forum on February 2.

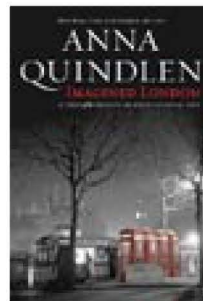
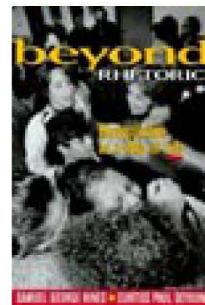
Beyond Rhetoric: Reconciliation as a Way of Life by Curtiss DeYoung & Samuel George Hines.

Dr. Curtiss DeYoung, Bethel associate professor of Reconciliation Studies, has partnered with Dr. Samuel George Hines, senior pastor at Third Street Church of God, Washington, D.C., to write *Beyond Rhetoric: Reconciliation as a Way of Life*. DeYoung expresses his feelings about this partnership

when he says, “this book is a unique father-and-son duet. The late Reverend Dr. Samuel George Hines was my father in the ministry.”

The hallmark of Dr. Hines’ ministry was reconciliation. This compassionate, respectfully written “duet” will instruct and inspire reconciliation as it moves you through chapters of biblical theology of reconciliation, the church as an agent in reconciliation and the practice of reconciliation.

If you are working toward reconciliation in your life, whether individually or in community, this book will help you understand the issues from a biblical and practical perspective and will encourage you toward continued growth.
